WRITER, DAVE BARRY, VISITS ISRAEL... AND WHAT DID HE HAVE TO SAY?

NOTE: The Yiddish words meaning, "This is my first visit here" are "Dos iz mein ershter bazuch do." The Yiddish word for "tourist" is "turist."

According to Rabbi Peretz Rodman ("Travel to Israel," MyJewishLearning.com), between one and two million people visit Israel each year. Some are Christians who come to walk in Jesus' footsteps. An increasing number come to do business ("geshefts"). Others come to have a good time in a country that offers scubadiving at the Red Sea, or wind surfing on the Mediterranean. The largest segment of visitors, though, are Jews coming to Israel because they are Jews and Israel is the Jewish homeland.

What did Barry have to say about his experiences as a "turist" in Israel? Grab a #2 pencil and let's see how well you can choose the Dave Barry quotes.

- 1. RE: AIRPORTS/SECURITY
